The student's primary work will be learning how to use Wikipedia (and other resources) to identify key people, events, and places. The information gathered during the week will be analyzed and discussed in class to show how it all fits together.

This is a 3 trimester course; an introduction to Spanish language, taught toward junior high level students. Recommended for 7th and 8th graders; other grade levels may be admitted upon instructor approval. The course focuses on vocabulary of everyday life, the present tense of verbs, and culture; listening, reading, writing, and speaking the language will be practiced. If taken in sequence with "Spanish B" next year, the two courses together are the equivalent of high school Spanish I, after which students may enroll in Spanish II. Students will be delving into historical fiction literature. *Nory Ryan's Song* is a gritty story about the potato famine of Ireland which took place from 1845-1852. *Indian Captive* tells the story of Mary Memison, a young girl captured by Seneca Indians from her family's farm in eastern Pennsylvania. Our third book, *Out of the Dust*, depicts what life was like for those living through the dust bowl in the US in the 1930's. The structure of the novel is unusual in that the plot is advanced entirely through a series of first-person free verse poems. There are weekly reading assignments, quizzes, homework assignments, and small projects due throughout the trimester. This class will be graded.

In this first trimester students will put their detective skills to use as they learn about the genre of mystery and suspense. Students will read a wide variety of mysteries including: Murder on the Orient Express by Agatha Christie, The Thirty-Nine Steps by John Buchan, and short mysteries by Herodotus, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Dorothy Sayers, Roald Dahl, and selections by Edgar Allen Poe. There are only two books to purchase for this class; all other readings are included in the course handbook. We will approach the literature within a Christian worldview. The final grade will be based on class participation, study questions, weekly quizzes, one essay and final exam. Reading will be about 100 pages per week.

This is an introductory course to the "Art of Argument," by Aaron Larsen, which will help your student(s) to become more adept at critically thinking through issues they may face. By peering into the other side of the coin, our young people will become better equipped to counter wrong ideas when confronted and be able to recognize a "moot" point when they hear it. Relevance, Presumption, and Clarity will be explored for those taking all three trimesters as we work through 32 lessons of logic. The first trimester will cover an Introduction to Logic, Fallacies of Relevance, *Ad Fontem* arguments, (which are arguments against the source,) and about halfway through Appeals to Emotion, at the rate of approximately 7 pages of the text per week. There will be vocabulary, quizzes and tests throughout the year. A final grade will be given based upon the material covered each trimester. Why not give Logic a try?

This is a foundation music class that will focus on how music speaks, and how musical speech has developed over time, beginning in the ancient world up through the modern age. There are no required prerequisites. Students will be required to attend one performance of classical music on the Notre Dame campus during the year, which will be the only required expense (\$10-\$20). All other expenses are optional (i.e. if the student wishes to purchase CDs, a study score, etc...) Required scores will be provided by public domain, for which students must have a free Spotify account, usually via Facebook, which has all the recordings. This class is not high-power and overwhelming. It will place emphasis upon the contemplation of the beautiful. It will also make an effort to create overlap and connections with History 9-12 and Literature 9-12. Homework will consist of simply listening to music, with an attentive ear and open heart. One term paper will be required, of any length the student desires.

Astronomy: 6-8 / Period 6 / SAH / 1T

This class introduces Classical Astronomy, emphasizing the visual observation of the cycles of the Sun, Moon and stars with the unaided eye. We will learn useful and practical skills, such as how to tell time without a clock, and how to navigate by the sky. Our focus for first trimester is the Ecliptic, the Fall Sky, The Lunar calendar, and the Sun. We will also study Modern Astronomy and Meteorology in later sessions. For the first trimester, we will be using Jay Ryan's book, Signs and Seasons, as our main textbook. This will be available for a rental fee of \$3. Homework will include research on the web, and periods of observation of the night sky. Grades will be based on homework assignments, class discussions and chapter tests. Students will need internet access for reading assignments, research, homework and tests. Students will need a folder or notebook for handouts.

Biology II: Human Anatomy and Physiology: 10-12 / Periods 3 and 5 / SAH / 1T

The first trimester of The Human Body: Fearfully And Wonderfully Made starts with a review of concepts learned in Biology I. We will then explore in depth the histology of tissues, especially of the bones and muscles. There will be readings from the text, and further study using the Anatomy Coloring Book by Kapit and Elson. At least two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, and will include coloring book exercises from the textbook. Mandatory dissections, microscopy, and module tests will be done in the Lab section of the class. Grades will be based on laboratory assignments and module tests. Biology I is required, or permission of the teacher. Parents are encouraged to check the Study Guide Questions in preparation for the module tests. An answer sheet will be given for this purpose. All students taking Biology II must take the Laboratory also.

The first trimester of Advanced Biology Laboratory Section will cover Laboratory Safety and microscope use. Drawings will be made from the microscope work, and dissections performed under supervision. All module tests will be taken during the lab period. There will be further study using the Anatomy and Physiology Coloring Book by Kapit and Elson. **All students taking Biology II must take the Laboratory also.**

Marine Biology: 10-12 / Period 1 / SAH / 1T

Exploring Creation with Marine Biology concentrates on marine wildlife and marine habitats. It provides a survey of members of each biological kingdom that live in marine environments. The student will learn about the microscopic organisms that make life in the ocean possible, including details about their interesting habits and life cycles. The student will also learn about the anatomy of many macroscopic marine creatures such as clams, starfish, and sharks. They will then learn how these creatures and their physical surroundings form marine ecosystems such as intertidal zones, estuaries, coral reefs, continental shelf communities, epipelagic communities, and deep-ocean communities. The course ends with a study of marine resources and our relationship with the sea.

Physical Science: 8-10 / Period 7 / SAH / 1T

The first trimester of Exploring Creation with Physical Science, 2nd Edition starts with an introduction to atoms and molecules. We will explore the composition of air and the atmosphere, and then learn about the structure of water and the hydrosphere. There will be readings from the text, and from the Apologia website. Two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, with a high emphasis on lab reports. Grades will be based on laboratory reports and module tests. Algebra is required. Students will be required to have a notebook or folder for laboratory reports, and access to a computer for readings. Parents are encouraged to check the Study Guide Questions in preparation for the module tests. An answer sheet will be given for this purpose. Students may decide to do extra reading during the Christmas break.

Physics: 11-12 / Period 7 / MH / 1T

Physics is a three trimester course of High School introductory physics, based on the book <u>Exploring Creation with Physics</u>, 2nd <u>Edition</u> by Dr. Jay Wile. This class is designed to prepare the student for university-level physics courses.

Please note that this book is set up for use over 32 weeks; our three trimesters have only thirty weeks, so there will be some acceleration (pun intended) in the material covered in the first trimester. Due to instructor's scheduling constraints, there will be no separate lab section.

First Trimester: Basics of motion

The first trimester begins by studying motion and Newton's Laws, covering the following topics:

- Motion in one dimension (speed, velocity and acceleration)
- Equations for one-dimensional motion (displacement, velocity, acceleration and time)
- Free fall
- Two-dimensional vectors
- Motion in two dimensions
- Newton's three laws
- Applications of Newton's second law

Most class periods will have some experiment or demonstration of the material discussed.

Exploring Creation with Zoology 2: Swimming Creatures of the Fifth Day is the second year of introductory Zoology, with an emphasis on Aquatic Animals. The first trimester introduces us to the ocean, its makeup and habitats. We will study whales, seals, and reptiles, and their relatives. There will be about two hours of homework per week, to include reading from the text and answering questions from the text and classroom demonstrations. We will also be building an Ocean Box, to show each creature we study and where in the ocean it lives! The Ocean Box will be worked on continuously during the year, and will be put on display at the Open House at the end of the year. Grades will be based on homework assignments and chapter tests. Students will need a notebook for handouts and lab work.

This course covers 30 lessons about poetry over the three trimesters. The course ends with a study of marine resources and our relationship with the sea.

Marine Biology: 10-12 / Period 1 / SAH / 3T

Exploring Creation with Marine Biology concentrates on marine wildlife and marine habitats. It provides a survey of members of each biological kingdom that live in marine environments. The student will learn about the microscopic organisms that make life in the ocean possible, including details about their interesting habits and life cycles. The student will also learn about the anatomy of many macroscopic marine creatures such as clams, starfish, and sharks. They will then learn how these creatures and their physical surroundings form marine ecosystems such as intertidal zones, estuaries, coral reefs, continental shelf communities, epipelagic communities, and deep-ocean communities. The course ends with a study of marine resources and our relationship with the sea.

The third trimester of Exploring Creation with Physical Science, 2nd Edition explores the four fundamental forces in creation, introduces the periodic table of the elements, and concludes with the nature of sound and light. There will be readings from the text, and from the Apologia website. Two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, and will include experiments from the textbook. Grades will be based on laboratory assignments and module tests. **Algebra is required.** Students will be required to have a notebook or folder for laboratory reports, and access to a computer for readings. *Parents are encouraged to check the Study Guide Questions in preparation for the module tests. An answer sheet will be given for this purpose.*

Physics: 11-12 / Period 7 / MH / 3T

Physics is a three trimester course of High School introductory physics, based on the book <u>Exploring Creation with Physics</u>, 2nd <u>Edition</u> by Dr. Jay Wile. This class is designed to prepare the scholar for university-level physics courses.

Please note that this book is set up for use over 32 weeks; our three trimesters have only thirty weeks, so there will be some acceleration (pun intended) in the material covered in the first trimester. Due to instructor's scheduling constraints, there will be no separate lab section.

Third Trimester: Optics, Electricity and Magnetism

The third trimester expands the study to cover how optical devices work, what electricity is and how it is used, and the basics of magnetism. The following topics are covered:

- Geometric optics
- Coulomb's Law
- The electric field
- Electric potential
- Capacitance
- Electric circuits
- Magnetism

Most class periods will have some experiment or demonstration of the material discussed.

There will be about two hours of homework per week, to include reading from the text, and answering questions from the text and classroom demonstrations. This course covers the basic introduction and reinforcement of the Institute for Excellence in Writing (IEW) program. Please read the general statement for ALL IEW courses, above. Beginning with the Key Word Outline, the students learn how to gather information from source texts. Then, they learn the PROCESS for transforming those facts into meaningful reports, stories, and essays. Students enrolled in this course should understand what a complete

sentence is and have had some writing experiences. Reluctant writers welcome! Weekly assignments are from 1-5 paragraphs long, and are due by 5:00 p.m. the Monday after the assignment is given. This will be a graded course.
